Context

- Hundreds of languages are spoken in Canada, including more than 70 languages that are Indigenous to the country
- French and English are the official languages of Canada
 - French and English have official status at the federal level, in the province of New Brunswick, and in the territories
 - French is the sole official language in the province of Quebec
- French speakers are in a minority situation
 - In provinces and territories other than Quebec
 - In Canada as a whole

Some language concepts from the Canadian census



Mother tongue

First language that was learned in childhood, before attending school, and that is still understood at the time of the census



Home language

Languages spoken at home and the frequency at which they are spoken

- Main home language (spoken most often)
- Secondary home language (spoken on a regular basis, but not most often)



Knowledge of languages


Capacity to conduct a conversation in a language



The French language in Canada: trends over time





Why is the relative proportion of the French-mother-tongue population decreasing?

- Aging population
- Historical underrepresentation of French speakers in international migration
- Outside Quebec, shift towards English as a main home language and incomplete transmission of French from parents to children
 - Higher rates of transmission in monolingual families, as well as in mixed-language families in which the mother has French as a mother tongue or can conduct a conversation in French
 - While parent-level factors are strongly related to the likelihood of transmission, ecological factors are also positively associated with transmission, including the local-level concentration of the Frenchmother-tongue population




Local-level distribution of the Frenchmother-tongue population





Distribution of the French-mother-tongue population by its neighbourhood-level demographic weight, 2021








Relationship between local-level concentration and the use, transmission and knowledge of French




Retention of French as a main home language





Adoption of French as a main home language








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Occurrence of mixed-language couples






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Transmission in monolingual families




Note: Proportion of children aged under 18 years who have French as their mother tongue, among children who lived with two French-mother-tongue parents at the time of the census.



Conclusion

- The concentration of French speakers at the neighbourhood level is associated with the use, transmission and knowledge of French both in Quebec and outside Quebec
 - We cannot infer causality
- While a minority language nationwide, the majority status of French in Quebec is reflected in the results
- Other indicators available in the Canadian census (i.e., language of work, language of instruction) or in the Survey on the official language minority population (i.e., use of language in the public sphere, when accessing services) could warrant further exploration
